- Defend the State Low-Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC)
- Advocate for Establishing the Permanent Emergency Rental Assistance Program
- Oppose the Criminalization of Homelessness
- Advocate for More Funding for the State Housing Trust Fund and State Housing Voucher Program

## **State Updates**

• The governor has signed all the bills we support that have passed. (Click here to see all the bills the governor signed this year). The governor vetoed on seven bills this year, and none of them are in our Radar.

- HB 399: Support
  - o requires residential landlords who own or operate 25 or more single-family or duplex rental properties in Georgia to employ at least one in-state staff member responsible for managing tenant communications, including maintenance requests and other property-related issues.
  - Passed. Governor signed. Act 315.
- SB 35: Support
  - SB 35 would mandate that insurance companies provide homeowners with an extended notice period before their homeowners' insurance policy is nonrenewed. This change would afford policyholders additional time to prepare for and react to nonrenewal decisions.

Passed. Governor signed. Act 277.

# **State Updates**

- HB 136: Support
  - The bill amends Georgia's income tax code to expand tax credits for contributions to foster child support
    organizations, including wraparound and mentorship services for justice-involved youth, extends the credits to
    certain insurance companies, and establishes conditions, reporting requirements, and processes for certifying and
    decertifying qualified organizations.
  - Passed. Governor signed. Act 182.
- SB 85: Support
  - o Creates the 'Georgia Foster Care Scholarship Act.' The act provides grants to eligible students who are current or former foster care children. The total award amount per semester is not to exceed the costs of the eligible student's tuition, room, board, meal plan, and books associated with matriculation at an eligible postsecondary institution, minus any amount covered by federal or other state grants or scholarships. The maximum award per year will not exceed \$30,000. Eligible students will remain eligible for such awards until one of the following events occurs: the student earns a bachelor's degree, a maximum number of hours has been attempted, or the student has received the scholarship for 10 years. The act is subject to appropriations.
  - Passed. Governor signed. Act 120.



# **State Updates**

- HB 223: Support
  - O HB 223 would provide tax relief for individuals and businesses impacted by Hurricane Helene. The bill excludes disaster relief or assistance grant payments for agricultural losses from taxable net income to ensure recipients are not financially penalized for receiving aid. Additionally, it establishes refundable income tax credits for timber producers who suffered casualty losses due to the hurricane, helping them recover from significant financial setbacks.
  - Passed. Governor Signed. Act 70.
- HB 495: Support
  - O House Bill 495 transfers the Center for Rural Prosperity and Innovation from the University System of Georgia to the Department of Agriculture. The bill establishes the Georgia Rural Development Council to provide guidance and oversight for the center's work. The center is tasked with promoting rural economic development through research, leadership training, industry-specific support, and collaboration with nonprofits and educational institutions. It will also assume the responsibilities of the Centers of Innovation Agribusiness and may establish satellite offices to support local communities. The center must submit a 10-year strategic plan annually to the General Assembly.
  - Passed. Governor signed. Act 311.
